Buffaloed

MANHATTAN, Kan. (AP) — North Dakota State has proven over the years that it's not afraid to play anybody.

The two-time defending national champions in the Football Championship Subdivision have knocked off Colorado State from the Mountain West, Minnesota from the Big Ten and Kansas from the Big 12 over the last few years, each time planting a flag for smaller schools everywhere.

The Bison left their biggest mark yet on the college football landscape Friday night with the win over defending Big 12 champion Kansas State.

Brock Jensen backed into the end zone from a yard out with 28 seconds left to finish off a frantic fourth-quarter rally and lift the Bison over the Wildcats, 24-21.

"So much determination and resolve when we were down, and many, many teams have come in and Kansas State's jumped up and had folded," Bison coach Craig Bohl said. "Our guys did not do that. I thought our assistant coaches made some really excellent adjustments when we needed to."

The Bison trailed 21-17 when they got the ball back with about 9 minutes left in the game. But behind the unflappable poise of Jensen, their senior quarterback, they put together a rambling 18-play drive that covered 80 yards — and included four third-down conversions — for the go-ahead score.

"It was just one of those moments where we had to gut it out," said Jensen, who also threw for 165 yards and two scores. "That was the most gutsy performance I've seen in my entire life."

Turns out that Kansas State coach Bill Snyder had a similar opinion.

"They play very, very hard," he said. "They're a tough football team. They played harder than we did, they were tougher than we were, they were better coached than we were."

Much of the credit for that goes to

Bohl, the longtime assistant coach at Nebraska who has led the Bison to back-to-back FCS national championships. The defensive guru matched wits with Snyder on an annual basis during the early years of the Big 12, often coming out on top.

"They are a tremendous program," Bohl said, "so for us it's a great win."

Jake Waters helped the Wildcats build a 21-7 lead by the third quarter before everything fell apart. He wound up throwing for 280 yards and two touchdowns but also was picked off

twice, the second on a desperation heave after the Bison had taken the lead.

That sealed the biggest win in North Dakota State's history.

When the final gun sounded, the Bison raced to midfield to celebrate and then headed to the corner of the end zone that was painted yellow by their fans — a strong contingent in the crowd of 53,351, the second-largest ever to see a game at Kansas State.

"We've had a lot of these types of wins," Bohl said, "but never over a program like this."

Sam Ojuri had 10 carries for 127 yards, and John Crockett also ran for 50 yards for the Bison. Ryan Smith caught eight passes for 72 yards and a touchdown.

It was a glum way for the Wildcats to wrap up a festive day on campus.

The school dedicated a \$90 million renovation to the west side of its stadium in a ceremony attended by Gov. Sam Brownback and Sens. Pat Roberts and Jerry Moran. Along with a ribbon-cutting, the school also unveiled an 8-foot bronze statue of its beloved coach.

Snyder even made the rare decision to leave his team on game day for a few hours to attend the ceremony, but joked that if the Wildcats stumbled "it's all going to be on my shoulders."

Then again, perhaps the 73-year-old Snyder wasn't joking at all.

Kansas State struggled early on with Waters taking over for departed Heisman Trophy finalist Collin Klein under center. The Bison took advantage of the lull — and a 49-yard punt return by Christian Dudzik — to take a 7-0 lead on Jensen's 5-yard pass to Smith late in the first quarter.

The Wildcats finally got on the board when Waters completed four straight passes, capped by a 45-yard touchdown toss to Thompson early in the second quarter. But both teams squandered chances to seize a halftime lead — Waters was picked off deep in his own territory, only for the Kevin Vaadeland to drop a TD catch and Adam Keller to clang a field-goal attempt off the left upright.

Kansas State threatened to break the game open in the third quarter.

Waters followed a couple short completions with a 56-yard touchdown pass to Lockett, who had run right past Williams to get open. On the ensuing series, backup QB Daniel Sams made his season debut on third-and-3 at the Bison 17 and ran almost untouched for a touchdown that made it 21-7.

North Dakota State was on the ropes when Jensen engineered a 12-play, 75-yard touchdown drive that he capped with a 9-yard pass to Vaadeland. The Bison twice converted short third downs.

Keller atoned for his miss by hitting from 41 yards to make it 21-17 after three quarters.

The Wildcats were still clinging to that lead when North Dakota State got the ball back in the fourth quarter. Jensen methodically led the Bison downfield, picking up a first down at every key juncture, and then used his legs to carry them into the end zone for the go-ahead score.

"Any time you have the lead and you let it go to a good team, it's upsetting," Kansas State linebacker Tre Walker said. "You have to give them credit. They played well. Even when they were down they kept playing, and tonight we came up short."

Obama Grants Amnesty to Illegal Immigrants, No Congress

Congress hasn't passed immigration legislation, but that hasn't stopped President Obama from issuing directives that grant amnesty to illegal immigrants.

Last week, the Obama Administration issued the latest in a line of policy directives granting amnesty by default. This latest directive instructs Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) officials not to enforce immigration laws in cases where an illegal alien is the primary provider for any minor child—regardless of the child's immigration status—or the parent or guardian of a child who is a U.S. citizen or legal permanent resident.

In a statement about the new directive, House Judiciary Committee chairman Bob Goodlatte (R-VA) declared:

President Obama has once again abused his authority and unilaterally refused to enforce our current immigration laws by directing U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement

agents to stop removing broad categories of unlawful immigrants.

In June of last year, the Obama Administration's Department of Homeland Security issued a memorandum telling U.S. immigration officials how they should "enforce the Nation's immigration laws against certain young people who were brought to this country as children and know only this country as home." The move essentially served to implement major portions of the DREAM Act—which has been introduced and failed in Congress more than 30 times—by executive fiat.

Efforts to preserve and protect families are important considerations when it comes to immigration reform. Heritage has often argued that "strong families are priceless, providing an abundance of benefits to both adults and children and creating the bonds of strong societies." Any such effort, however, should be not only compassionate but also fair and respectful of the rule of law. As we've said before:

A proper solution would

uphold the principles of immigration reform and not open the door to a blanket amnesty. Finding an actual solution through the legislative process would give the law legitimacy and more permanency, and it might even result in a bipartisan agreement.... In our system of government, Congress is the legislative branch and is responsible for making the laws. Presidents are supposed to "faithfully execute" the laws to the best of their ability, not reshape them to suit their own policy goals.

Instead, fixing America's broken immigration system requires a more thoughtful approach. Neither sweeping executive action nor a massive, do-it-all-at-once bill offers truly meaningful reform. In fact, any path that promises amnesty would only make matters worse.

There is a better way forward—a practical, fair, and responsible path to address the nation's broken borders and immigration mess. If only Congress and the Administration would listen.

Geary County Land Sale Gets Few Buyers

JUNCTION CITY, Kan. (AP) — Developers and Geary County officials scrambled to build new housing and infrastructure amid predictions of a population boom from the return of the Army's 1st Infantry Division to its historical home at Fort Riley.

The soldiers arrived, swelling their numbers on the Kansas post from slightly more than 10,000 in 2006 to more than 18,000 by 2011. But the demand for off-post housing never materialized and developers abandoned hundreds of lots — some already equipped with streets, sewers and other infrastructure — that are now in tax delinquency.

Now, Geary County is finding the lots a hard sell, even for as little as \$1 apiece.

A recent tax sale of 280 lots drew a handful of bidders and

ended with just 24 parcels sold for a total of \$2,276 plus an additional \$100 fee per lot to record the deed, according to The Daily Union in Junction City.

Most of the proceeds will go toward the county's expenses in arranging the tax sale, which amounted to about \$40,000 plus staff time.

"The county doesn't want to be in the realty business," assistant county attorney Lloyd Graham said. "This is uncharted territory for me. I don't know that there's many options" for county commissioners.

Officials suspect potential buyers were put off by a special assessment the county had imposed to finance the building boom. While the sale cleared back taxes and special assessments, buyers will pay the

future assessment for 15 years — at up to \$2,000 or more per lot.

"I wish we could have sold more," said Sheriff Tony Wolf after the auction. "On the flip side, I can't blame people for the apprehension. This is a very big gamble."

Wolf said the lots that didn't sell this time at Wednesday's auction could go to auction again in the next tax sale that's likely to be held in January or February.

Geary County Treasurer Kathy Tremont wasn't surprised by the lack of buyers, noting her office received few inquiries on the vacant lots.

"I think there was a lot of curiosity," Tremont said, noting that curiosity often evaporated when the price of special assessments was revealed.

Analysis: Process Stirs Angst In Kan. Court Debate

TOPEKA, Kan. (AP) — Gov. Sam Brownback's critics have focused more on the process that led him to nominate his chief counsel to the Kansas Court of Appeals than on whether the nominee is qualified.

The Kansas Senate expects to vote this week on Brownback's appointment of Caleb Stegall to the state's second-highest court. He's likely to win confirmation by a wide margin, barring a surprise revelation or huge misstep, because the governor's fellow GOP conservatives hold a supermajority in the Senate.

Stegall generally is expected to be a conservative voice on the court, but much of the criticism of his nomination has centered instead on Brownback's refusal to release the names of other candidates. Critics argue that Kansans don't know whether Stegall was the best candidate available, as Brownback and his aides have asserted.

And the governor's critics still are protesting a law that took effect in July, changing

how Court of Appeals judges are selected. Under the old system, still in place for Kansas Supreme Court seats, a nominating commission led by lawyers screened applicants and named three finalists, with no role for lawmakers after the governor's appointment. Now, the governor's office screens the candidates and he makes the appointment, subject to Senate confirmation.

Conservative Republicans' control of the Senate would automatically smooth the way for any Court of Appeals nominee's confirmation. But a large vote in Stegall's favor seems even more certain because he's not being attacked directly.

"I think he's qualified," said Sen. David Haley, of Kansas City, the ranking Democrat on the Senate Judiciary Committee. "The question is the process."

Brownback is calling the Legislature into special session Tuesday to fix a law allowing convicted murderers to be sentenced to at least 50 years in prison. Because lawmakers are meeting, the Senate is legally obligated to consider pending appointments, and its Judiciary

Committee has scheduled Stegall's confirmation hearing for Tuesday. The full Senate expects to vote on his nomination Wednesday.

Stegall, 41, served two years as Jefferson County's elected prosecutor before joining Brownback's staff when the governor took office in January 2011. He also was an attorney in private practice, best known for defending four Americans detained in Haiti after trying to remove 33 children who they believed had been orphaned in its 2010 earthquake. It was later determined that the children had parents, but Stegall's clients returned to the U.S. without facing charges.

He graduated third in his law school class at the University of Kansas in 1999, later serving as a clerk for then-Chief Judge Deanell Tacha of the 10th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Denver. He was an attorney in the state's largest private law firm for four years before opening his own office outside Lawrence in 2005. Tacha and a bipartisan group of attorneys wrote recommendation letters for Stegall.


Seaton's published their own corporate salaries, as they find joy in doing with others each year.

When you add the ingredients of a chicken Caesar salad into a wrap, you have the perfect lunch or dinner. Chicken

Caesar salad is probably my favorite lettuce salad and I have always wanted to try it in a wrap. These wraps consist of diced chicken, romaine lettuce, parmesan cheese, Caesar dressing, and spinach tortillas. This recipe is great because the Caesar dressing is homemade and these wraps are so easy to prepare. The use of the meat from a rotisserie chicken saves a lot of time and effort and makes this salad a good option for a quick meal. If you cannot find the spinach tortillas, multi-grain ones will work as well. Enjoy.

- Ingredients:**
 Caesar dressing- 1/4 cup
 mayonnaise
 1/4 cup grated parmesan cheese
 2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice
 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard
 1 garlic clove (minced)
 1/4 cup olive oil
Other-
 1 (2 1/2 pound) rotisserie chicken (skin and bones discarded, meat removed and shredded into bite-sized pieces)
 1 romaine lettuce head (turn into bite-sized pieces)
 4 (10 inch) spinach wraps

Cooking Instructions:

Step 1: In a large bowl whisk together mayonnaise, Parmesan cheese, Worcestershire

sauce, lemon juice, Dijon mustard and garlic. Whisk in the olive oil, slowly and little a time until well incorporated.

Step 2: Add the chicken and lettuce to the bowl and toss

with the dressing. Divide the salad mixture evenly among the tortillas. Roll up and secure with a tooth pick. (Makes 4 Servings)

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



Pete Rose agreed to a lifetime ban from Major League Baseball, George Bush, Sr. was president, and San Francisco suffered from a major 7.1 earthquake the last time that Kansas State University lost the first home game of the season. After a day of celebrating the football program, Kansas State fans experienced a crushing defeat during a game that the current student population expects as an easy win kicking off the season. After the game, Kansas State fans probably heard from many friends throughout the Big 12. As a OU Sooner fan of mine asked, "was it the longest 8:30 experienced by you at Bill Snyder Family Stadium?". I thought back to the 95-degree heat I stood in for over an hour earlier in the day during the ribbon cutting ceremony, and I easily said, yes, that 8 minutes has to be the longest.

So what happened? As coach Snyder summarized while the football team prepared well he believed NDSU played harder and tougher than we did, and we were out-coached. Defense struggled to stop NDSU and they controlled the ball a full 12 minutes more than Kansas State did. Offensively, Kansas State did not struggle as badly, and while coach Snyder used the word ok, Waters connected with both Lockett and Thompson for a total of 221 yards. In what coach Snyder called possibly the biggest coaching mistake, Daniel Sams came in scored a touchdown after a 17 yard run and then was taken out. As effective as the offensive was, when Kansas State needed Waters sustain the lead during the end of the game the running game continued to struggle, but then Waters two interceptions during the 3rd and 4th quarter stunted Kansas States passing game.

Next week Kansas State faces Louisiana-Lafayette at home at 5:30pm. While the offense will most likely focus on creating a successful running game, the defense will need to examine what their key to success will be in stopping the other team from scoring.

• Friday's game between Kansas State and North Dakota State marked the start of the 118th season of college football at K-State.

• The Wildcats are now 486-616-41 (.433) in program history, including a 170-86-1 (.663) mark under head coach Bill Snyder...

• Tonight's matchup was the second meeting between the Wildcats and Bison, but the first since 1931... Bill Snyder-led K-State teams had won 20 consecutive season openers... The last loss for a Snyder-coached team in a season-opener was Sept. 9, 1989 at Arizona State (31-0)... Under Snyder since 1990, K-State is 56-3 (.949) against regular season non-conference opponents at home... Since the start of the 1990 season, K-State is 125-28-1 (.814) when playing at Bill Snyder Family Stadium... The Wildcats are now 7-1 in the month of August, including a 5-1 record under Snyder.

• A capacity crowd of 53,351 attended tonight's game... The sellout crowd was the second-largest in school history and the largest for a home opener... It was also the 16th sellout since head coach Bill Snyder's return in 2009.

• Kansas State extended its scoring streak to 204 consecu-

tive games on a 45-yard touchdown pass from Jake Waters to Tramaine Thompson... The streak is the eighth-longest in the nation and the second-longest in the Big 12... The game was tied, 7-7, at halftime...

• Junior quarterback Jake Waters made his first-career start on Friday night... He became the first player to enter K-State straight from the community-college ranks and start the season under center since Michael Bishop in 1997... Waters finished the night 21-of-29 for 280 yards and two touchdowns and two interceptions... He threw his first-career touchdown pass in the second quarter, a 45-yard strike to Tramaine Thompson, while he connected on a 56-yard touchdown pass to Tyler Lockett on the third play from scrimmage in the second half... His 280 yards were the most in a home opener since Dan Manucci passed for 343 yards on Sept. 16, 1978 against Auburn.

• Sophomore quarterback

Daniel Sams entered the game in the third quarter and tallied a 17-yard touchdown run on his first play of the season... Sams carried two times for 17 yards and saw two plays of action.

• Junior wide receiver Tyler Lockett carded seven receptions for 113 yards and a touchdown... It was his third career 100-yard receiving game, which is one shy of entering the school's top-10 list... His 56-yard touchdown reception was a career-high and was the longest passing play for the Wildcats since Collin Klein and Chris Harper connected on a 62-yard reception at TCU on Nov. 10, 2012...

It was the longest scoring play on a pass for the Wildcats since Dec. 3, 2011 against Iowa State when Klein found Tramaine Thompson for a 68-yard touchdown pass... Thompson joined Lockett with a 100-yard game, totaling 108 yards on six receptions and a touch-down...
