# Next Up Is West Virginia For Cats

MANHATTAN, Kan. - Kansas State's game against West Virginia on October 26 will kick off at 2:45 p.m., and will be televised by FOX Sports 1, the Big 12 and FOX announced Monday.

The game, which will be the Mountaineers' first ever trip to Manhattan, will mark the third time this season the Wildcats will play on FOX Sports 1 following the North Dakota State and Louisiana games.

Last season, No. 3 K-State defeated 15th-ranked West Virginia, 55-14, in Morgantown in a nationally-televised game on FOX.

Kansas State (2-4, 0-3) is idle this week before hosting West Virginia, which serves as the annual Homecoming game and the 150th anniversary celebration at Kansas State University. ### K-State Holds Weekly Football Press Conference Head Coach Bill Snyder

On where the team is halfway through the season...

"We are trying to get ourselves better, and in some cases we have. In terms of our last ballgame, we have improved play with our offensive line. I think that was evident to most people. I thought our quarterback play - even though we had some problems, as did our offensive line - was improved collectively. I thought the play

of our front seven with the exception of the last drive was improved greatly. I think our effort collectively has improved. Although it wasn't 100 percent, it was better. I think that we are beginning to practice better, which is most significant with me, and I think the result of the areas that I talked about where there was improvement was a result of their practice effort during the course of the week."

#### On the improved quarterback play...

"I think the result is practice time - focusing on what is significant and improve in areas that certainly need improvement. I thought Jake (Waters) ran the ball well in the ballgame - and we are trying to bring along his ability to do that - but I thought he had some difficulty throwing the ball. We had less turnovers, but the one at the end was a critical turnover in the ballgame. So we still haven't mastered everything, but we are knocking on the door."

#### On how the coaches understand the quarterbacks' style of play...

"I think we understand how they play. I don't think we ever had any doubt. In fact, we have understood from the beginning. It is just a matter of getting them to understand the system - trying to get them to do the things we are doing without making mistakes."

#### On Daniel Sams' playmaking ability against Baylor...

"He allowed us to move the football and be more effective with our offense, but we still had some correctable miscues. The ballgame boiled down to us giving up four big plays on defense and two critical penalties on offense that equated to 21 points. That had a major impact on the outcome of the ballgame. Offensively, we scored three touchdowns on six trips into the red zone. That was 18 points left off the scoreboard because we only got a field goal out of it. If it pays, there is about 39 points we should have had. Those are the

mistakes that you have to overcome and get corrected. It is really that simple. There are certainly some other issues that we need to address, but you take those segments out of the ballgame and you certainly put yourself in a position to win the game. From an offensive standpoint, the fact that we did not do a good job of managing our timeouts - we wasted our timeouts in the third quarter - and at the end of the game when we desperately needed them, we didn't have them."

#### On the 2-4 start to the season...

"Being 2-4 is never easy and neither is the response to it. How you respond to it and how you feel about it is difficult for the players, coaches and the people that are invested in this program. The important thing for us is not what could have been, but what are we going to do. That is the way that we have to approach it with the determination that says - what I say every single week - we

have to eliminate the costly mistakes. We have to practice with the focus of doing exactly that, improve our practice time and therefore our performance level on game day will improve."

#### On Daniel Sams' increase in carries having an impact on his season stamina...

"I am always concerned. I am concerned about our offensive linemen that take 70 snaps a ballgame or a defensive lineman or anyone else. They all get hit. It is a physical game, as is evidenced. We have a bunch of players that have been out for a period of time and it has taken a toll on their health as well. It is the nature of the game for everyone else as well, not just us."

#### On John Hubert's improvement against Baylor...

"I think that John has been practicing better, and consequently it has helped improve his play. He still has a ways to

#### game to get the team fired up...

"The message was just to pay attention to details. How good of a player do you want to be in this program? I have had some great role models since I have been here, some great teammates like Collin Klein, Arthur Brown, both of which had so much attention on them constantly. Whether that be media or outside influences just trying to get their attention and how they were able to cope with that and eliminate distractions. I think that is such a key if you want to be a great player in the program - to eliminate distractions and focus on the team, take coaching and apply everything that your coaches said. Every rep you do and anything you do in practice, just being coachable, because those are the little things that carry over to the games."

#### On Coach Snyder's compliment about how no one practices harder than him...

"It is obviously a tremendous compliment from the legendary coach. It means no plays off for me from here on out. I just have to keep trying to push my teammates to hopefully get the same compliment. I would rather have coach say, 'I have never had a team practice like the one that I am coaching right now.' That would be a bigger compliment to me, personally."

#### On his forced fumble against Baylor and if it was the best play he has ever made...

"It was a good play. It got a lot of attention, but I would not have been able to make the play if it was not for the secondary behind me giving me enough time to get to the quarterback. Any play, it is never a one-person play, it is a team defense and everyone helped me make that play."

#### Sophomore Wide Receiver Kyle Klein

#### On the offense this year as opposed to last year...

"Just like rebuilding an engine, we had to replace a couple parts from last year. It's taking us a little while to get

things rolling, but we have definitely been making progress. Lack of turnovers certainly helped us against Baylor."

#### On having to win four of the next six games to be in the postseason...

"It has been on the team's mind because we do have to win four of the next six games to see a bowl game. That is something that we obviously all want to do. I think the rally cry is just getting better. Every week we have gotten a little bit better and made improvements, so I think as a team we are really close to getting traction and moving forward. Hopefully after the bye week we will be able to start back strong against West Virginia and gain momentum for the second half of the season."

#### Sophomore Quarterback Daniel Sams

On how he would rate the offense at the midway point in the season...

"We are progressing, slowly but surely. We have given up a lot of points in the red zone. I have not been finishing as far as the interceptions late in the game. We've shown some bright areas, but we still are not where we need to be."

#### On if the offense has more of an identity now...

"Yeah, I would say that. I mean, we still are not where we need to be. As far as me finishing at the end of the game, interceptions is something that we cannot have. We still have areas that we need to improve, but I feel like we will get there."

#### Sophomore Defensive Back Dante Barnett

#### On where the defense has made the most strides during the season...

"I think that we have made a lot of strides, especially coming from the Oklahoma State game to the Baylor game. We have made a lot of strides, and I have seen a lot of improvement in every aspect on the defense. We are playing more consistent. Over the last two games, we have played more consistent, although mistakes have hurt us in the end."

## Over Easy...

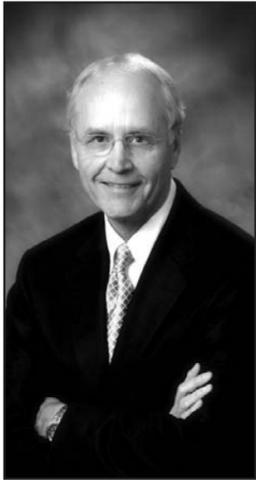
"The goal is getting a solid idea of the cost to build (Parks & Recreation Department offices) at city hall, or a better alternative, to garner the savings to pay for it, and if we can't do that then it's a dead horse." That was City Commissioner Rich Jankovich's conclusion in Tuesday's ongoing political drama over a \$2.95 million expansion and renovation of the City Hall auditorium, now more properly called Peace Memorial Auditorium.

City Commission notes will help us recall how we got to this point in time.

On June 4, 2013, the Commission approved a design contract for renovation of the auditorium to include new Parks and Recreation offices and an expansion of the gymnasium floor at the expense of an outdated stage. The contract was awarded with the contingency that the legal department identify any restrictions based on the auditorium being a memorial that couldn't be modified. The city attorney later opined that there was no such restriction.

On July 22, the Historic Resources Board passed a "not-so-fast" motion saying the City must take, "... into account the historic elements of the facility, before the completion of the design phase of the project."

On September 3, the City Commission directed staff to


negotiate a new contract with the architects to study alternatives, including renovating the auditorium stage, as well as adding Park and Recreation offices to City Hall.

Tuesday, that negotiation came back to the Commission for approval at an additional cost of almost \$40 thousand. And after much clarification, hand-wringing and posturing, the contract was approved unanimously. Commissioner Usha Reddi said, "I still want it at the same budget level that we had," and then admonished her fellow commissioners for spending more money on consulting fees without ever seeing drawings. Good for her!

Mayor pro tem Wynn Butler, a fiscal hawk, and the Commission's leading liberal, Karen McCulloh, provided the evening's entertainment. Butler seemed to win the larger argument with general agreement that the overall renovation budget would remain at \$2.95 million. But McCulloh won a strategic battle with approval of her motion extending the architectural design contract options to include preserving the auditorium stage, which has been at the heart of the argument all along.

The arts community earlier rallied support for preserving

the stage around the dubious theme that it was a memorial to World War II veterans, even though there's no such distinction in the existing memorial plaques at the auditorium or anyplace else. But it made for

a good storyline and generated support from some notable veterans around town.

In the end, we hope the Commission does as it suggested Tuesday night, sans

Commissioner McCulloh who at one point blurted: "I've already made my choice!" Meaning? She will vote against any renovation that does not include preserving the stage. But the others seemed

correctly more concerned with getting suitable offices for the parks department - on budget - and less with a minority agenda of upgrading a stage that has shown little utility in the past. We applaud their approach.

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

  - 1 bag (12 oz) frozen unsweetened mixed berries
  - 3 cups fresh strawberries, cut into quarters

**Directions**

1 Spray bottom and sides of 13x9-inch (3-quart) glass baking dish with cooking spray. Place bread cubes in dish. In large bowl, beat eggs, half-and-half, 1/4 cup sugar, the cinnamon, salt and vanilla with wire whisk until smooth; pour over bread cubes. Cover tightly; refrigerate at least 4 hours but no longer than 24 hours.

2 Heat oven to 400°F. Uncover dish; bake 25 to 35 minutes or until golden brown and knife inserted in center comes out clean.

3 Meanwhile, in 2-quart saucepan, stir together 1 cup sugar and the cornstarch. Stir in orange juice until smooth. Stir in mixed berries. Heat to boiling over medium heat, stirring constantly. Cook about 6 minutes, stirring constantly, until topping is slightly thickened. Remove from heat. 4 Just before serving, stir strawberries into topping. Serve warm over French toast bake.

The USDA has said it's trying to fight childhood obesity and related health problems. But its standards on school

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

## Kansas State Slows Baylor

Kansas State faced Baylor's impressive 70-point scoring offense first thing in the game Saturday. Kansas State's defense started out able to hold Baylor to third and eleven but quickly the penalty challenges that K-State had during the game against OSU seemed to be making a return. Baylor was quickly in the red zone and scored in just a couple plays.

When the Wildcats took the field with their first possession, Waters took the helm as the quarterback and started the offensive game quite differently. The plays were mixed up and while K-State did not score, Waters showed some confidence that has not been seen before. At the end of the drive Kansas State decided to go for it on 4th and 1 instead of kicking a field goal. The choice to not kick for the points can easily be debated, but gusty plays can make the difference in close games. While this play was not successful, continuing to test the offensive abilities can only help develop Kansas State fundamentally.

The next offensive posses-

sion for Kansas State put Daniel Sams at quarterback. Sams rushed eight plays for a total of 78 yards to put the Wildcats on the board with the first touchdown. Kansas State continued to battle Baylor defensively holding them to 9 first downs in the first half, even after losing cornerback Kip Daily with 13 minutes left in the 2nd quarter. Baylor's Corey Coleman hit Daily helmet to helmet on a play that most fans thought should have resulted in a targeting penalty. On Monday this week, the Big 12 did rule that a penalty should have been called and Coleman will sit out half a game, a bittersweet ruling for a young man who had to spend the game on the sidelines.

There was much for Kansas State to be happy about during the first half, they held Baylor to only 9 first downs and Kansas State had the ball a full seven minutes more than Baylor. With Tramaine Thompson and Tyler Lockett out again this week, both Kyle Klein and Zach Trujilio were able to provide Kansas State with some minor passing yards. Daniel Sams accumulated 124

rushing yards in the first half, and John Hubert had 6 carries for 32 yards. Even so, at half-time the score was Baylor 21, Kansas State 10 so obviously there were some improvements that the Wildcats needed to make over halftime. When Baylor fumbled the snap, and Ty Zimmerman pinned them on a 12-yard loss, Baylor easily completed a pass play brining them back to the last line of scrimmage. During this and several plays, Wildcats defensive got burned on passing plays where confusion and ability to cover their man continued to challenge them.

The third quarter provided many highs and lows for Kansas State. Kansas State held Baylor to three and out for the first time in the game and only the second time for Baylor this entire season. Baylor remained scoreless the entire 3rd quarter. The Wildcats blocked a punt that put them on Baylor's 19-yard line and Ryan Mueller forced a turnover that most players in the NFL would envy. Kansas State scored 15 points in the 3rd quarter, but also continued to struggle on 2-point conversions. During this quar-


ter, Daniel Sams also made his way to the locker room with what appeared to be a shoulder injury. He returned to the game later. One of the most difficult issues the Wildcats faced early in the second half was using all of their time outs before the end of the 3rd quarter. Poor clock management was frustrating and caused the loss of timeouts that could have been used near the end of the game.

Baylor scored in 30 seconds at the beginning of the fourth quarter with another long pass to Tevin Reese. Defensively, the Wildcats had no answer for this hot Baylor offense. Kansas State penalties, lack of timeouts, and a final interception by Sams just put a nail in the coffin that the Wildcats built themselves. As Bill Snyder summarized it after the game, "It still boils down to mistakes."

Kansas State had every opportunity to win the game on Saturday. The Wildcats have another bye week to provide an opportunity to work on minimizing penalties and turn overs before they face West Virginia for Homecoming on October 25 at 2:45pm.

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# Wildcats Comes Up Short In Loss To Baylor

MANHATTAN, Kan. (AP) — Kansas State knew it needed to hold onto the ball better than it did last week to have a chance of knocking off No. 15 Baylor on Saturday.

The Wildcats were doing a good job of it, too, until the game was on the line.

Daniel Sams threw his fourth interception of the season in the closing minutes, with the Wildcats trying to drive for the go-ahead score, allowing the Bears to escape with a 35-25 victory.

"I think at the end of the day, and I don't see them as little things, it still boils down to mistakes," said Kansas State coach Bill Snyder, whose team had five turnovers in a loss to Oklahoma State a week ago.

Ahmad Dixon had the interception for the Bears (5-0, 2-0 Big 12), who ran their winning streak to nine games dating to their upset on unbeaten Kansas State last season.

Bryce Petty threw for 342 yards and three touchdowns. Tevin Reese had five catches for 184 yards and two scores, and Antwan Goodley had five catches for 139 yards and another touchdown.

"It was a huge team win all-around," said Petty, whose three TD passes all went for more than 50 yards. "The defense stepped up huge. I thought they had a great game."

Sams ran for 199 yards and three touchdowns for the Wildcats, who led 25-21 midway through the third quarter. But they twice failed on 2-point conversion attempts, missed a tying field-goal try in the fourth quarter, and then Sams was picked off by Dixon to seal the outcome.

The defending Big 12 champion, Kansas State (2-4) is 0-3 in the Big 12 for the first time since 2004, shortly before coach Bill Snyder stepped away for a brief retirement.

"It's too many points to give up," Snyder said. "I don't care if it's Baylor or anybody else."

The Bears had scored at least 28 points in the first quarter of each of their games this season, so it was a mild victory for the Wildcats that they only managed a lone touchdown on Saturday.

Petty finished off a grinding 12-play, 59-yard drive by sneaking across the goal line on fourth down to give Baylor the lead. But the Wildcats quickly answered early in the second quarter, when Sams carried eight consecutive times on a 78-yard drive that he finished off with a 1-yard plunge.

Baylor's score-a-minute offense finally got on track midway through the second quarter, and it was a breakdown by the Kansas State defense that provided the window.

Reese ran past defensive back Randall Evans and Petty hit him in stride for a 93-yard touchdown reception, the second-longest scoring pass in the Bears' 115-year history.

The Wildcats answered with a 68-yard drive that they capped with Jack Cantele's 24-yard field goal, but the Bears needed all of two plays and 38 seconds to score again. This time, it was Goodley who hauled in a 72-yard pass from Petty to give Baylor a 21-10 lead heading into halftime.

So accustomed to games being over by then, perhaps the

Bears forgot they needed to keep playing.

The Wildcats marched 13 plays on the opening drive of the third quarter and Cantele's 32-yard field goal made it 21-13. Kansas State quickly forced a Baylor punt, and Weston Hiebert broke through the line and got his hand on it to give the Wildcats prime field position.

Sams, who had briefly gone to the locker room with a shoulder injury, returned to score on a 2-yard plunge. His 2-point conversion pass was batted away, though, leaving Baylor with a 21-19 lead.

The Bears gave the ball right back when Petty was stripped by Ryan Mueller while scrambling toward the sideline. Kansas State took over at Baylor 44 and needed just 12 plays to finally pull ahead.

Undaunted by giving up 15 straight points, Baylor came right back early in the fourth quarter. Petty hit Reese on a 54-yard scoring strike to give the Bears a 28-25 lead with 14:33 to go.

"We busted the coverage," Snyder said. "There was miscommunication and someone wasn't disciplined and focused enough to get what the scheme is."

The Wildcats still had chances down the stretch, only to fitter them away.

Cantele pulled a 41-yard field goal wide left that would have tied the game with 6:49 left. After the Kansas State defense held, Sams was picked off by Dixon with 3:48 remaining when it appeared that the sophomore quarterback was trying to throw the ball away.

Glasco Martin added a 21-yard touchdown run with 1:16 remaining to put the game away.

"We moved the ball at times but we kind of shot ourselves in the foot at times, too," said the Wildcats' Jake Waters, who shared time with Sams at quarterback. "For the most part I thought we played good enough to win the game. We've just got to make those plays to get the W."
