Kansas State Wildcats Hire Jeff Mittie

Jeff Mittie, one of the winningest active coaches in NCAA Division I with more than 450 career wins, 15 post-season appearances, nine conference titles and five conference coach of the year honors in 22 years of coaching, has been named the ninth head women's basketball coach at Kansas State. Athletics Director John Currie announced on Tuesday.

Mittie agreed to a five-year contract approved by the K-State Athletics, Inc., Board of Directors and President Kirk Schulz. Mittie – who was selected after a national search by K-State's search committee of Currie, Senior Women's Administrator Jill Shields, Faculty Athletics Representative Dr. Be Stoney and Chief of Staff and Assistant Athletics Director of Administration Clint Dowdle – will be paid \$375,000 in the first year of the deal with \$25,000 annual increases each year remaining on the contract. He will also receive a \$140,000 signing bonus.

"I want to thank President Schulz and Athletic Director Currie for giving me this opportunity. I think this is a great opportunity for Shanna and me and our family. It is a tremendous opportunity at a terrific institution that, I believe, in women's basketball has proven that the fan base can get excited about. This was the youngest team in the Big 12 this year, so I am excited to work with the players. I am always excited about developing a team and that challenge. I think Kansas



State and my family will be a really great fit. I am looking forward to getting recruiting started across the state of Kansas and developing those very important relationships."

Mittie, 47, has achieved an overall record of 454-234 (.660) in his 22 years as a head coach, which includes stops at Missouri Western, Arkansas State and TCU. His .660 career winning percentage ranks 45th among active Division I head coaches and 21st among active coaches with 20 or more years of experience.

Mittie has averaged 21 wins and 10 losses per season and experienced only one losing season in his 22 years of head coaching. Fifteen times Mittie has advanced his teams to either the NCAA or WNIT Tournaments, in which he has a combined record of 15-13. Over the last 14 seasons, Mittie guided TCU to 13 winning seasons with 11 consecutive post-season appearances, including

nine NCAA Tournament berths.

At TCU, Mittie compiled a 303-175 (.634) record while exceeding the win total the program accomplished in the first 22 seasons of existence. Prior to Mittie's arrival, TCU owned a 208-402 (.340) mark. He recorded his milestone 300th victory at TCU on Feb. 19 of the past season during a home win over Kansas State.

"We are thrilled to welcome Jeff, Shanna, Logan, Madison and Jordan Mittie to Manhattan and the K-State family," Currie said. "Coach Mittie's success as a head coach at three different institutions, Midwest background as well as his reputation as a top-notch recruiter make him the ideal fit to lead our women's basketball program. We set out to find the very best basketball coach for K-State, whose personal values and integrity reflects those of our university and one that appreciates the unique opportunity of

being part of our strong basketball tradition and commitment to championship performances, and we are confident that Jeff Mittie is that person. I look forward to the entire K-State Nation having the opportunity to get to know him and his family."

Mittie has received a number of accolades during his coaching career including: 2010 Mountain West Coach of the Year, 2002 Conference USA Coach of the Year, 2001 WAC Coach of the Year and 1994 and 1995 MIAA Coach of the Year. He has also led his programs to nine conference titles.

In addition to personal honors, Mittie has mentored several of his players who have reached the WNBA (Sandora Irvin and Adrienne Ross) or played overseas (Helena Sverrisdottir and Antoinette Thompson), been honored as an All-American, earned conference player of the year awards, all-league citations and

academic all-conference awards. During his time with TCU, Mittie coached 10 of the 12 members of the school's 1,000-point club and five of the nine members of the 500-rebound club.

Mittie's success at TCU expanded his coaching tree, as a pair of his former assistants moved on to head coaching positions in Division I. Former assistants Larry Tidwell and Yolanda Wells-Broughton have moved into head coaching positions at Lamar and Texas Southern, respectively.

Prior to his tenure at TCU, Mittie pieced together a 75-42 (.641) mark in his four campaigns at Arkansas State, posting a pair of 20-win seasons and winning 17 or more contests in each of his four years with the Lady Indians. Twice his teams topped the Sun Belt Conference in grade point average as well.

Before taking over the Arkansas State program, Mittie fashioned a 76-17 (.817) mark in three years as head coach at Missouri Western. In 1995, Mittie guided the school to a remarkable 31-3 slate, which included a 15-1 conference record, and he led the club to the Division II Final Four. That squad finished the season ranked No. 3 nationally and captured both the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletic Association regular-season and tournament championships. For his efforts, he was tabbed league and district Coach of the Year, and was among eight finalists for the national honor.

Mittie garnered league

Coach of the Year honors for the first time in his career in 1994 when his Griffons posted a 29-3 overall and 16-0 league record and captured the MIAA regular-season title. His club also made a trip to the NCAA Elite Eight. Before assuming the head coaching duties, Mittie served one season as assistant basketball and baseball coach at the school.





Manhattan is within \$50 million of reaching the limit. \$50 million sounds like a lot of money but the City and the Manhattan Chamber of Commerce have been working for the past year with a "Private" Group to takeover the City Parks and spend \$52 million. In doing so they would destroy about everything build in the last 20 years. That one project would put Manhattan above the State Debt Limit so they need help.

Any project financed by the Public Building Commission would not count against the Total City Debt. It gives them a way to go around the State Law. There will be no stopping the Cities ability to take City Debt to new heights.

They are not "Excluding" the City of Manhattan or the State of Kansas.

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Kansas State Faced The Iowa State Cyclones

Kane struck early with a drive to the basket where he was fouled by Spradling. Kane missed the free throw but soon the Cats were down by 4 because ISU was out rebounding K-State early. Iwundu was the first to put the Cats on the board, but it was Marcus Foster who drained the first three pointer.

Shane Southwell started the first five minutes of the game by scoring five points. This was exciting to see after the lackluster return he has had since his injury.

K-State began to try to force turnovers, but Gipson makes a bad pass on a clean two point opportunity. That is where the mental focus for the Cats will be so important. When they get rattled they struggle with their decisions. With 11:42 left to go in the half, Kane tied the score with a three point shot, then quickly another bad pass gives ISU the opportunity to take the lead. Luckily they miss the shot, and Omari Lawrence is fouled driving to the basket. The makes both free throws to put KSU up 21 to 19.

Kansas State had 8 fouls to Iowa State's 3 with 7:43 left in the first half. Besides the bad passes so far, they played aggressively and was working hard to keep ISU from the basket. So, it forces them to go back to the three point shot, and Kane drains one to put Iowa

State back up 25 to 23 with 6:38 left in the half. Soon Iowa State makes 3 straight to make it 33-28 at 4:37 left to play in the half. With 2:28 left in the game, Marcus Foster played Kane very well and drew an important foul to put KSU back within 2 points.

Iowa State goes on a huge run and gets up over the Cats 44 to 38, but with 15 seconds left Marcus Foster drains a three and makes the halftime score 44-41 Iowa State over KSU. At the half, Kansas State was shooting at 55%. A shooting percentage of that would normally be plenty to a keep a team in the lead, but the Cats

have 9 turn overs in the first half. They cannot keep control of the pace of the game with the turnovers they have had. Marcus Foster was leading K-State with 16 points at the half. ISU was also out rebounding KSU 22-16.

Coming back in the second half, the game set the same pace. Iowa State continued to keep the game on a fast pace. The game continued to be intense, and Marcus Foster received his third foul with 15:40 left in the game. Nigel Johnson ties it with a 3-pointer, but a foul on a second chance shot put ISU back up 57-54

with 13:39 left. The Cats continue to fight to get back on top and Omari Lawrence hits a free throw to for the first lead of the second half 60-59 with 11:47 to go.

The intensity continued to build, with six lead changes, and then again when Gipson tied the game up again with 8:07 left to play. Nigel Johnson was fouled soon after and his free throw puts the Cats up 70 to 68. Sadly though, down the line even with Gipson's last minute scoring attempt, door decisions resulting in turn overs put K-State out of the tournament with Iowa State winning 87-85.

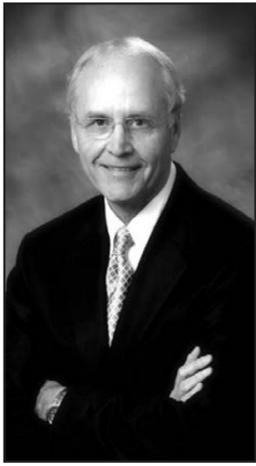
County Commissioner Dave Lewis says, "It could allow special-interest groups to find and allow a non-professional police person to run for that position."

Facebook's in frenzy: "Making this an elected position means any yahoo could run or someone could simply buy their way into office by outspending their opponent during a campaign."

Such drama we have in little ole Manhattan over the Riley County Police Department's directorship. Seems some folks may not be too happy with our friend, Brad Schoen, these days. Interestingly, this comes up a few days after Aggieville's Fake Patty's Day?

Cutting to the chase - there are citizens who don't care much for how the RCPD operates, believing it is not college town friendly. While others are convinced the department is all that separates us from Sodom and Gomorrah.

The CAT group has proposed, through a state legislative initiative, that the RCPD director be an elected position. Today, the director serves at the pleasure of the seven-member Riley County Law Board,

which is self-appointed by the county and city commissions. Presently, the board includes three county commissioners, the county attorney and three city commissioners.


The county is responsible for most of the department's capital expenses, like the RCPD building. While the city funds most of the annual operating costs, including salaries and benefits. The law board annually approves the director's budget; the city and county are then required by state law to fund it. Thus, the law board levies its own tax needs. Imagine public works doing that?

The board's makeup sets up a somewhat perverse relationship, as the county has little responsibility for the operating expenses and likewise the city for capital needs. So, votes are often split around whose ox is being gored at the time.

The director, Mr. Schoen, is responsible to the board. And some citizens - like those proposing this change - don't believe he's getting appropriate direction. And they point out that no other Kansas county and only a handful nationally operates like the RCPD. Most have elected county sheriffs and city cops.

RCPD is an effective outfit with resources available to it that would not be possible with a city police/sheriff setup. And whether the RCPD director is elected or appointed probably

doesn't matter all that much, although we are not quite so leery of voter wisdom as seems to be the case with Lewis and social media.

However, we do believe the

RCPD should be a county department not only in name but in reality. The director should have a boss just like the county's health department director and city's fire chief.

Independent agencies, like our RCPD, are too often insulated, high cost institutions without effective oversight, and that does breed citizen resentment.

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

Ingredients Snickerdoodle Cookie Base

- 1 pouch (1 lb 1.5 oz) Betty Crocker® sugar cookie mix
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

- 1 Heat oven to 375°F. Lightly grease 9-inch cast-iron skillet with shortening or spray with cooking spray.
- 2 In large bowl, beat cookie mix, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, the vanilla and eggs with electric mixer until just combined. Add 1/2 cup butter; beat until smooth. Spread mixture in skillet.
- 3 Bake 25 to 30 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Remove from oven; place skillet on cooling rack.
- 4 Increase oven temperature to 425°F. Grease cookie sheet with shortening or line with cooking parchment paper.
- 5 To make Oat Topping, in small bowl, stir together oats, brown sugar, granulated sugar, flour and 1 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon. With fork, mash 1/2 cup butter into dry mixture until crumbly. Sprinkle water over mixture; stir briefly. Spread mixture on cookie sheet.
- 6 Bake at 425°F 5 to 8 minutes or until mixture is golden brown around edges and bubbly in center. Remove from oven; break up topping with fork. Topping will be soft at first, but will harden as it cools. Cool topping completely on cookie sheet.
- 7 Top Snickerdoodle Cookie Base with apple pie filling. Heap oat topping over pie filling. Spoon whipped topping onto top center of dessert; sprinkle with additional cinnamon. Store in refrigerator.

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Kansas State Scores 17 Runs Against Air Force

Nine different Wildcats drove in a run while all 13 K-State hitters reached base safely as the K-State baseball team extended its winning streak to 11 games with a 17-2 victory over Air Force on Tuesday at Tointon Family Stadium.

For the fourth straight game, K-State (12-7) scored double digit runs and has now plated 62 runs in the four-game stretch. The Wildcats also had 17 hits against Air Force (4-14), led by three from reigning Big 12 Player of the Week, Mitch Meyer. The outfielder went 3-for-6 with a double, triple, two RBI and three runs scored.

Of the Wildcats' 17 hits, seven were for extra bases, including three triples. In addition to Meyer, Tyler Stover and Shane Conlon also registered three-base hits. The triples were the first of the season for each of the three players.

K-State's 11-game winning streak is tied for the third-longest in program history. Over the streak, the Wildcats are batting .363 – including a .453 clip in the last four games

– while the pitching staff has a 2.36 ERA.

After scoring a single run in the first inning on a sacrifice fly from RJ Santigate, K-State scored two runs in the second, four in the third and five in the fifth to open up a 12-2 advantage. The four-run third witnessed four straight batters driving runs while the five-run fifth was highlighted by a three-run double by Tanner DeVinny that made it 10-2.

K-State added its final five runs in the seventh, three of which were driven in by Conlon with his triple. Prior to Conlon's bases-clearing hit, Lance Miles and Kyle Speer both drove in a run with a single.

The RBI in the seventh was Miles' second of the game, as the second baseman was one of five Wildcats with multiple RBI in the contest. DeVinny paced K-State with a career-high four RBI.

The K-State offense has averaged more than 15 runs per game since March 14, but the pitching staff has also been stingy. Starting pitcher Nate Griep earned his first win of the

season after he allowed two runs on six hits and struck out five in five innings pitched. Four K-State relievers each turned in a scoreless inning of

work – and combined to allow just two hits – to help the Wildcats hold their opponents to five runs in the last four games.

David Thomas had three of Air Force's eight hits in the game, including a leadoff home run in the fourth inning of Griep.

Trent Monaghan took the loss for Air Force. The left-hander allowed 11 runs (10 earned) on nine hits and two walks in 3 1/3 innings.

Kivett Selected As Candidate For Senior CLASS

Ross Kivett of the K-State baseball team was selected as one of 30 candidates nationwide for the Senior CLASS Award. To be eligible for the honor, a student-athlete must be classified as an NCAA Division I senior and have notable achievements in four areas of excellence – community, classroom, character and competition.

Kivett, senior infielder and outfielder for the Wildcats, has played in 189 career games for

K-State, including 171 consecutive starts. He is among K-State's top-10 on career lists for games played, games started, hits, singles, triples, stolen bases, sacrifice hits and hit by pitch.

Last season, the All-American and 2013 Big 12 Player of the Year helped the Wildcats win their first conference title in 80 years, host and win their first NCAA Regional and earn the program's first berth in the NCAA Super

Regional round. Kivett, a native of Broadview Heights, Ohio, was selected by his hometown team, the Cleveland Indians, in the 10th round of the 2013 Major League Baseball Draft, but he elected to return to school for his senior year.

Majoring in Communication Studies, Kivett has a cumulative 3.343 grade point average, including a 4.0 grade point average in the 2013 fall semester. Over the last four years, he

has worked with several student-athlete community service initiatives such as Cats for Cans, Cats in the Classroom, and Tip-off for TP.

Kivett is joined by Mark Payton of Texas and Jordan Piche of Kansas as the three Big 12 student-athletes among the list of 30 candidates.

An acronym for Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School®, the Senior CLASS Award focuses on the total student-athlete and

encourages students to use their platform in athletics to make a positive impact as leaders in their communities.

The 30 candidates will be narrowed to 10 finalists midway through the regular season, and those 10 names will be placed on the official ballot. Ballots will be distributed through a nationwide voting system to media, coaches and fans, who will select one candidate who best exemplifies excellence in the four Cs of

community, classroom, character and competition. The Senior CLASS Award winner will be announced during the 2014 College World Series® in June.

In 2008, Brett Scott was named a finalist for the award, becoming the only K-State Baseball student-athlete to be selected as one of the final candidates for the prestigious honor.
