

White Way Car Run Saturday

On May 15, 1914, 20 men in five cars set out from Effingham to join forces with other counties and communities along the Central Branch Railroad to organize a 365-day road that would eventually link Chicago to Colorado Springs. Their destination was Frankfort, a distance of 71 miles. The roads were fine and dry that day, they reported, and they reached the town in about three hours. When a reporter asked one of the drivers if he had been frightened at the speed they traveled, he replied, "Just once, and that was all the way out and back."

The meeting drew more than 500 people, and was the begin-

ning of what would be known as the Kansas White Way. Organizers originated from two starting points, Atchison in the east and Concordia in the west, both equidistant from Frankfort.

A recreation of that car run will be held on Saturday, May 10, beginning at 8 a.m. in both Atchison and Concordia. Frankfort will again be the epicenter as convoys of vintage vehicles depart from the Atchison County Historical Society Museum in Atchison and the Brown Grand Theater in Concordia to honor those visionaries who brought us one of the first organized highways in the state of Kansas.

The Kansas White Way became Highway 9 in the mid-twenties when roads were designated with numbers rather than names. Much of the original route has been changed though portions remain. With the exception of a little dogleg through the unincorporated town of Rice to cross the stone arch bridge, today's route from Concordia to Clyde follows the original route along the Central Branch Railway.

A car run in 2006 brought about 200 people to Frankfort. As in 1914, many drivers attached themselves to the convoy as it passed through their towns. In 1914 about 80 people

to join and drive over and enjoy the gathering in Frankfort. Cars should start coming through Blue Rapids about 11:30 until 1:30.

Towns along the route are encouraged to welcome drivers. The car run will include modern vehicles, classic cars, Cushman motorcycle clubs, and vintage cars of all makes and models.

Blue Rapids Library Looking For Donations For A Book Decorated Quilt

A quilt depicting children's books is a fundraiser for the Blue Rapids Public Library's expansion project. For \$25, people can sponsor a quilt block, which will be in the shape of an open book. Donors will choose their favorite children's book. The name of the book, the author and the donor's name will be printed on the book's "spine." Donors can choose the fabric for their book from a basket of fabric at the library. The 56-block quilt is being put together by library board mem-

ber Kathy Crawford. The finished quilt will be hung in the new addition. Donors also will be asked if they would like to write a short description of why they chose their book. Green Energy Rule Survives Legislators

TOPEKA, Kan. (AP) — Kansas legislators have preserved a requirement that utilities rely on wind and other renewable resources to generate some of their electricity, despite months of lobbying by conservative groups for its repeal.

But the groups are promising to return to the Statehouse next year to renew their campaign against a law mandating that utilities have renewable resources cover 20 percent of their peak generating capacities

by 2020. And lawmakers on both sides of the issue expect another debate.

Critics of the green-energy mandate could get a bill repealing it through the Senate this year but not the House. They were pursuing a new proposal Friday, as lawmakers were wrapping up their business for the year, but the House voted 63-60 to block debates in either chamber. Legislators adjourned early Saturday.

"It will be a priority next year," said Jeff Glendening,

state director of the anti-tax, small-government group Americans for Prosperity, a leading backer of repealing the mandate.

Critics of the renewable-energy mandate also include the Kansas Chamber of Commerce, influential among GOP members of the Republican-dominated Legislature. And the conservative American Legislative Exchange Council, which counts dozens of Kansas legislators as members, has drafted model repeal legislation.

Smear Campaign

TOPEKA, Kan. (AP) — Kansas Gov. Sam Brownback says an FBI investigation into the activities of his former chief of staff is a smear campaign. He says there was no wrongdoing in the awarding of contracts to privatize the state's Medicaid program.

Brownback told The Wichita Eagle Monday that he's not seen evidence of criminal activity related to lobbying or the awarding of the contracts in

2012. A person familiar with the investigation told The Associated Press that the FBI has been looking for several months into the activities of Brownback confidante David Kensinger and his Topeka firm, Parallel Strategies, which he and two former Brownback staffers formed last year. The person said the FBI had interviewed multiple people.

Obamacare Has A Pay Problem

OKLAHOMA CITY — Of the Oklahoma residents who enrolled in Obamacare, just 48 percent have paid the first month's premium, the U.S. House Energy and Commerce Committee says.

"This actually fits with the data in Oklahoma on insurance participation," Jonathan Small, policy vice president for the Oklahoma Council of Public Affairs, told Oklahoma Watchdog. "Many Oklahomans

refuse to purchase auto insurance, even though it is affordable considering the risk and its guarantee issue."

As federal officials applaud increased enrollment in the federal exchange, scrutiny of premium payments is intensifying. While Oklahoma is among the lowest-ranking states in premium payments through the exchange, nationwide only two-thirds — 67 percent — of exchange enrollees have paid.

"The bottom line is Obamacare continues to fail. It doesn't matter what numbers the White House conjures up about enrollment, people don't want the government to force you to sign-up and force you to pay for health care," said John Tidwell, state director of Americans for Prosperity.

"After all, the president told us time and time again if you like your health insurance plan you could keep it; Oklahomans knew the lie of the year wasn't true and they still don't believe Obamacare is going to work," Tidwell said.

Other states with low first-month premium payment rates — less than 55 percent paid — include Texas (42 percent), Illinois (52), Mississippi (55),

and Michigan (55).

"This data represents all 160 insurance providers in the federally facilitated marketplace as of April 15, 2014," according to the House panel.

U.S. Rep. Fred Upton, R-Mich., said his panel is tired of "receiving incomplete pictures of enrollment." The panel's analysis concluded "the administration's recent declaration of success may be unfounded."

"Many Oklahomans refused to buy health insurance when it was considerably less than what is on the exchanges," said Small of OCPA, the state's largest free market think tank.

"Why would people who won't purchase auto insurance and wouldn't purchase health insurance when it was less expensive, purchase health insurance when it is even more expensive, and the individual penalty is largely unenforceable?"

Participants are not "fully enrolled" until they pay the first month's premium, departing Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius told News 9, the Oklahoma City affiliate of CBS News.

Home Notes...

Please don't say the D word. The D word you might ask? Several words may come to mind, but the one I am thinking about for this news column is Death. No one wants to think about it or talk about it because they seem to think that if they do they will die. In the end, the one thing everyone knows in life is the only sure thing is death and taxes.

It is difficult to make decisions or even know where to start after the death of someone close to you. When you are grieving, it is hard to think clearly. Taking notes, marking bills as paid with the check number and date, and maintaining a filing system can help. Here are some of the legal and financial issues that you may have to deal with in the time ahead.

Make a file containing documents you might need when filing for claims of any kind. You may already have these or you may need to collect them from other sources. Having the doc-

uments in one file makes handling business less stressful.

Have a list of contacts including address and phone number that the deceased did business with. Encourage family members to do this prior to their death so it isn't a burden on those left behind cleaning up the financial related issues.

Contact the deceased person's attorney regarding estate planning documents. These documents may contain information that will be necessary to carry out the wishes of the deceased person.

Check to see how the names are listed on various financial accounts and if you are able to access them. If you cannot access them you will need to contact an attorney for help.

File claims to receive death benefits from life insurance. Ask for help processing health insurance claims for the deceased person. Consider if the death of this person affects you in any way. It may prompt you to make some changes for yourself.

It is important to request

additional copies of the certified death certificates from the State of Kansas. This is in addition to those furnished through the funeral director. A certified document is usually required when filing claims. Certified copies of birth certificates or marriage licenses are available from the recorder in the county where these events occurred.

Do contact a representative from the Social Security Administration to check benefits. These might include a small lump sum death benefit and survivor benefits for spouse and/or children.

Find out what needs to be done to file federal and state tax returns. The accountant can help you with matters relating to estate taxes. Talk about tax planning for subsequent years.

Cancel credit cards of the deceased person. Determine if cell phone plans need to be adjusted. If appropriate, remove the deceased person's name from utility bills and other accounts.

Many people have an online presence. When writing a will

it is important to consider designating a digital executor.

The people you are contacting are not emotionally involved in your business. They might not always seem to be sensitive to your needs or understand how difficult it is for you to think clearly. It may help you to have a family member or friend go to appointments with you. This person can take notes, ask questions, and help you sort through the details.

K-State Research and Extension has various publications dealing with death. Publication can include: Decision After Death: Practical Suggestions Regarding Funerals or Memorial Services and Practical Suggestions Regarding Financial and Legal Matters. Learning to Live Through Loss: Grief and the Mourning Process, Understanding Men Who Grieve, Job Loss Triggers Grief, Helping Children Understand Death, and For Teenagers Facing the Loss of Someone You Love.

KU Grad Students Look To Union

Lawrence, Ks (AP) Some Kansas University graduate students are looking to a long-dormant union as a way to strengthen their voice and bargaining power at a time when their work schedules and benefits are at stake.

KU has said the university is considering a reduction of total graduate student work hours to adapt to the Affordable Care Act, which requires employers to provide group health coverage to employees working 30 hours a week or more.

Most teaching and research assistants work 20 hours a week under the terms of their appointment, but many work second jobs on campus to supplement their pay. The proposal

to limit total graduate student work hours to 20 per week would be a sizable hit to many students' income.

Last week graduate students learned about a detailed draft of the proposed policy on cuts to work hours dated Jan. 21, 2014, causing a new wave of anxiety for students.

Looking for a voice
When the work hours issue first came up, hundreds of graduate students responded by signing petitions asking administration to keep their work hours intact. Since then, some have seen the need for yet stronger leverage.

A labor union for KU graduate teaching assistants has been gaining new interest. Founded in the 1990s, the Graduate Teaching Assistants Coalition is affiliated with the American Federation of Teachers. But it existed largely as an empty organizational shell at KU for the past several years, with no active leadership and scant membership or presence at the university, current members say.

In recent weeks a handful of graduate students have been trying to create a new core of leaders for GTAC. They have also been working to boost

membership, which has been helped along by the work hours issue.

"This has been a big catalyst in getting people to sign up for the union and getting people involved," said Shane Willson, a Ph.D. student in sociology and one of the students involved in trying to reenergize GTAC.

"It was clear we didn't really have a voice," said Laurie Petty, also a Ph.D. student in sociology involved in reviving the union.

Willson said he personally has signed up 20 new members since an April meeting among graduate students from several departments to discuss the union, and more are signing up through other channels. On May 8 the union will host another open informational session for grad students.

New contract
Willson and Petty will be part of a GTAC team negotiating the graduate teaching assistant job contract with KU beginning next week.

KU opened negotiations with the American Federation of Teachers, in April. Gavin Young, a KU spokesman, said KU wanted to address teaching assistant salaries covered by

the contract, but he declined to comment on specifics before negotiations. The negotiations are unrelated to the work hours issue, Young said.

KU's longterm strategic plan calls for increasing internal and external funding for doctoral students, and Willson and Petty said they hope that means KU wants to increase wages through the negotiations.

They also hope the negotiation process will encourage more grad students to sign up to the union as a way to have a greater say in their compensation. "This is why we need a strong union," Willson said. "We need real input. We're real employees. We're grown people."

Forums
In a March statement to graduate students about the work hours proposal, Diane Goddard, KU vice provost for administration and finance, said the university was committed to providing students with information and gathering their input before making a decision.

Next week the university will hold open forums for graduate students to discuss the work hours issue with administration.




