## Riley County Commissioners Want A Building Commission

The Riley County Commission is made up of three men, "See no evil, Speak no evil and Hear no evil, yet what they are doing is Evil."

For more than 238 years Americans have taken pride in being able to Vote. That is about to end in Manhattan and Riley County Kansas.

Oh, it is so simple, all the County Commissioners want to do is form a Public Building Commission so they can build a new Ambulance Facility and a new County Courthouse. Now, what's wrong with that? The State of Kansas has stipulated that a County can only go into debt up to 3% of their Assessed Valuation. In Riley County that means the County may issue up to \$18 million in Bonds.

We do not know what a new Ambulance Facility will cost but the Commissioners have old plans on their desk that calls for a new Courthouse at \$30 million and plans for a new Courthouse with a new Jail at \$50 million.

They have also been looking at plans to take an existing business building and spend \$22 million to make it into a Courthouse.

A Public Building Commission (PBC) with the three Commissioners setting as the PBC Board could issue Bonds, build the buildings and then lease it back to themselves as the County Commission.

They will be able to do the same for the City of Manhattan,, the State of Kansas, Kansas State University, and USD 383 School District (and Riley

County School District) (and Blue Valley School District).

Here is what the PiperJaffray report on Public Building Commission said in 2013:

"A PBC may finance buildings or facilities maintained and operated for a county courthouse, county or city offices and related parking facilities and lease the same to the cities, counties or other enumerated governmental agencies."

It goes on to say: "Cities and counties may provide for PBC financing of other public facilities through home rule charter action."

Now the Commissioners will tell you that they have written the Bylaw in such a way that they can not fund the University. But what they will Not tell you is that now or at any time in the future the

Bylaw can be change by any two members of the Commission.

The Riley County Commissioners will be able to finance every public building project in Riley County and at the same time not allow you to vote on the project.

The Commissioners will tell you that public building projects will be subject to a protest petition, which state law does allow but here is what PiperJaffray said: "A referendum is required if a protest petition is filed by not less than five percent of the electors of the applicable municipality within thirty days after the last publication. **A city or county also may exempt certain PBC bond issues from the notice, protest and referendum requirements through home rule charter action.**"

They can and will take the vote away for Riley County Citizens.

The Commissioners are going to hold another meeting Monday, November 24, 2014 at 7 p.m. - "Riley Centre", 902 West Walnut Street, Riley, Ks to hear what you have to say about a building commission and taking away your vote. You and all of your friends should be at that meeting.

## Build Without Financing Every Other Public Project

Several years ago the Riley County Commission wanted to purchase the old Southwester Bell Telephone building. They could have created a Public Building Commission at that time but they didn't, they choose to purchase the building by Lease-Purchase, it worked well and it did not take the vote away from the public.

Now this Commission wants to build but at the same time they want to become a financial source for other government agencies, plus they do not want the Citizens voting on projects again. (See Editorial at left)

Here are some large projects built by the Gilbane Development Company, there are others:

### Loudoun County Government Administration Building



After experiencing more than a decade of dramatic employment growth, Loudoun County, Virginia, was in dire need of a new and expanded county administration building. The City preferred to develop the new facility in its historic downtown but was stymied as to how to do so. Fortunately, a greenfield suburban site appeared to offer a simpler, more cost-effective answer.

A landscaped plaza between the building and parking garage serves as an overland storm water relief system. The site was also planned to accommodate a future expansion of 112,000 square feet.

### Adult Mental Health Treatment Center



With a decreasing patient population and dispersed physical plant, Gilbane Development Company assisted Virginia's Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services (DBHDS) in formulating a strategic real estate plan for Eastern State Hospital that would consolidate campus operations, centralize patient buildings, and eliminate obsolete and inefficient structures

Gilbane served as developer, utilizing a turnkey development approach under Virginia's Public-Private Education Facilities and Infrastructure Act (PPEA). Under this project methodology, GDCo was responsible for all aspects of the project, including planning, design, entitlements and procurement, construction, commissioning and FF&E planning and approval (including managing the relocation from multiple existing facilities). This replacement facility represents the second phase of the redevelopment of the existing Eastern State Hospital campus.

## Why Does Washington Want to Hide Science Data From the Public?

When federal bureaucrats drive up costs for American families and businesses through heavy-handed regulation, it shouldn't be too much to ask for a solid scientific underpinning for that regulation. And it shouldn't be too big of a burden for the federal government to make its data available to the public.

Congressman David Schweikert's, R-Ariz., Secret Science Reform Act (HR 4012) would address this.

HR 4012 would force the Environmental Protection Agency to disclose all scientific and technical information before proposing or finalizing any regulation. Doing so would allow for independent analysis and allow qualified experts to reproduce the results. The public would have access to the data, computer codes and models, as well as descriptions as to how to use and run the data. The legislation would be an important check on an agency running rogue and landing punch after punch to the American economy.

Rep. Lamar Smith, R-Texas, chair of the House Committee on Science, Space and Technology, wrote in the Wall Street Journal that he "received a letter of support for the Secret Science Reform Act that was signed by more than 80 scientists, including physicians and professors of environmental science, physics, statistics, economics and engineering." He added:

The signatories included George Wolff, former chair of the EPA's Clean Air Scientific Advisory Committee in the Clinton administration, and Forrest J. Remick, former commissioner of the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission in the George H.W. Bush administra-

tion. They wrote that the bill would 'make the agency's regulations more accountable, credible and enforceable' and that its transparency requirements 'can be accomplished without imposing unnecessary burdens, discouraging research or raising confidentiality concerns.'

The federal government has been blazing a regulatory trail that significantly increases the compliance costs for businesses. Those businesses then in turn pass those costs onto families. If a company absorbs the costs, it will prevent them from investing, innovating and employing.

You might be thinking: The environmental benefits we receive through cleaner air justify the massive costs imposed on our economy. But that's not the case.

The fact is that federal bureaucrats are regulating all aspects of the economy at extreme costs where the marginal benefits are almost nil. At the heart of this matter is Particulate Matter or PM 2.5. According to a Senate Environment and Public Works Committee minority report, "up to 80 percent of the benefits associated with all federal regulations are attributed to supposed PM2.5 reductions."

To illustrate how this works, consider the Environmental Protection Agency's mercury air and toxic rule. The EPA claims that the mercury air and toxics rule would produce \$53 billion to \$140 billion in annual health and environmental benefits. But the agency vastly overstates the environmental benefits by including estimated benefits from reducing particulates already covered by existing regulations. Not including these particulates lowers the projected benefit to only \$6 million, at most. In other words, these co-benefits account for 99.996 percent of the agency's estimated benefits — much of that being PM2.5 co-benefits.

Here's where the secret science comes in. The two studies that represent the scientific foundation for 1997 ozone and PM2.5 National Ambient Air Quality Standards are highly questionable and the data concealed, even though the studies were paid for by federal taxpayers and thus should be public property. Because the data is unavailable to the public, the two studies used to justify the

federal government's regulatory ambush have never been reproduced, independently verified or validated in any way. In fact, even without the data available, the studies have come under intense criticism.

Opponents of HR4012 label the bill as anti-science and a


roadblock for the agency. But the reality is the bill is simply anti-secret science. Is that too much to ask for from a taxpayer-funded agency?

Furthermore, a roadblock is just what this agency needs to prevent bureaucrats from unjustifiably extracting trillions

out of the American economy and destroying millions of jobs for no meaningful environmental benefit.

In March 2009, President Obama released a White House memo stressing that "the public must be able to trust the science and scientific process inform-

ing public policy decisions. Political officials should not suppress or alter scientific or technological findings and conclusions." If that's the case, the administration should welcome an opportunity to give the public access to the science and data to ensure politicians aren't altering the outcomes.



# Kansas State tops Southern Utah 98-68

MANHATTAN, Kan. (AP) — With memories of last year's season-opening 60-58 loss to Northern Colorado running through his mind, Bruce Weber wasn't prepared to see a half-time lead disappear again.

In its second-consecutive attempt to beat a Big Sky conference opponent in their home opener, Kansas State answered in record-breaking fashion. The Wildcats shot 66.7 percent from the floor in the second half and scored the most points in the Weber era.

Nigel Johnson scored a career-high 18 points and Thomas Gipson had 17 points and six rebounds Friday to lead Kansas State over Southern Utah 98-68 in the season opener for both teams.

"We led them last year at halftime and they came back and beat us," Weber said. "We were letting a team like that hang with us and you never know what could happen. It was a good start to the second half and we really got it going (offensively)."

The scoring performance was Kansas State's highest since an 87-point effort against Central Arkansas on Dec. 1, 2013. It was also is the highest score for Kansas State since a 100-76 win over North Florida on Dec. 31, 2010.

A.J. Hess had 16 points, including 12 in the first half, to pace the Thunderbirds, who are

coming off a 2-27 campaign in 2013-14.

Four other players scored in double figures for the Wildcats, including Marcus Foster and Tre Harris with 13 points apiece. Johnson had a career-high tying five assists.

The Wildcats opened the second half with 33-9 run, pushing their lead to 77-55 after 10 minutes and never looked back.

"We obviously shot the ball extremely well at 58 percent," Weber said. "Our guys were patient and got it inside (and) outside. We did a better job in the second half against their zone."

Johnson shot 3 of 4 from deep to aid the Wildcats' offense, which gave him all nine of his second-half points.

"I'm just trying to play and let it come to me," Johnson said. "My role is going to be different than last year. I didn't have to score that much, but I can shoot the ball well and I can score the ball."

Hess' fourth foul with 15:51 in the second half limited the Thunderbirds offensively as they shot 1 of 10 during the Wildcats' run. Southern Utah finished 20-for-49 from the field after shooting 45.8 percent in the first half (11-24).

Kansas State's physical play took an early toll on Southern Utah, forcing the Thunderbirds into 16 first-half fouls. Gipson chipped in 14 points

in the first half while the Wildcats went 18 of 24 from the free-throw line in the first half. Hess kept the Thunderbirds

within reach with an eight-point deficit at the break and chipped in a 4-for-7 performance from 3-point range TIP-INS

Southern Utah has now lost 28 of its last 30 games and head coach Nick Robinson falls to 13-48 overall in his three seasons with the Thunderbirds.

# No. 1 Kentucky Crushes No. 5 Kansas 72-40

INDIANAPOLIS -- Kentucky coach John Calipari made one simple adjustment to his game plan Tuesday night. He scrapped the zone.

The Wildcats didn't need it. Instead, a fierce man-to-man defense got No. 5 Kansas out of sync and No. 1 Kentucky ran away with its most impressive win of the season - a 72-40 victory in the State Farm Champions Classic.

"We kind of bum-rushed them a little bit and every time they looked there were more tanks coming over the hill," Calipari said. "It wasn't substitutes, it was reinforcements. It

kind of gets to you a little bit."

It also elicited exactly the kind of reaction Calipari wanted from his team.

The Kentucky faithful were on their feet cheering for Kansas blood like thirsty Romans at the Coliseum, and the Wildcats' exclamation was borderline cruel, really, Dana O'Neil writes. Story

After Kentucky (3-0) won its first two games by 40 and 19 points, they dominated Kansas despite having only two players reach double figures. Dakari Johnson had 11 points, Andrew

Harrison had 10 and Willie Cauley-Stein finished with seven points and 10 rebounds.

But they didn't need big-time scorers Tuesday.

The Jayhawks (1-1) made only 11 baskets -- eight in the first half, three in the second. They shot just 19.6 percent from the field and were 3 of 15 on 3-pointers.

Kansas finished with its lowest point total since Bill Self took over as coach in 2003-04, easily falling below the 49-point effort against Arizona in November 2005 and barely avoided becoming the first

Kansas team to finish with fewer than 40 points since a 37-point effort against Oklahoma State in February 1962.

Wayne Selden Jr. led the Jayhawks with nine points. Cliff Alexander finished with eight.

"We never once did anything that resembled a team offense at all and I hope they were the primary reason why," Self said after sipping a glass of water and joking that he needed a stronger drink to help ease the pain. "I knew that we haven't practiced well or done some things real well, but I didn't think it would be like this. No

matter how bad we shot it the first half we actually proved that we could shoot it a heck of a lot worse in the second."

Kentucky took advantage of Kansas' errant shots and never let up.

The Wildcats jumped to a 35-17 lead with 3:06 left in the first half, then allowed Kansas to close within 38-28 at the half. Kentucky then started the second half with six straight points, didn't allow a basket for almost six minutes, then extended the lead to 64-36 with and continued pulling away.

Kansas finally cracked the

40-point mark when Perry Ellis made two free throws with 2:53 left, but Kansas didn't score again.

"They (Kentucky) are pretty good for this early in the season," said Self, who beat Calipari in the 2008 national championship game. "One thing I would say that would be challenging for them, and this is a compliment to them, right now they're so far ahead where other people are, but other teams have a tendency to get better, too, and there will be teams out there who can challenge them. Whether they can beat them or not, I don't know."

## Kansas State beats UMKC 83-73

MANHATTAN, Kan. (AP) — Bruce Weber made sure his team understood Missouri-Kansas City's upset ability, having won its season opener at Missouri.

A steady dose of 3-point shooting and a stingy zone defense gave the Kangaroos a 40-36 advantage in the first half, but a deep, well-versed Kansas State offense came alive in the second half.

Thomas Gipson had 21 points and nine rebounds to help Kansas State beat Missouri-Kansas City 83-73 Monday night in the opening mainland round of the EA Sports Maui Invitational.

"I thought they were even better in the first half than they were in the Missouri game," Weber said of UMKC's growth. "They go to Missouri and win a gutsy game and they know how to play."

Marcus Foster made four 3-pointers and finished with 16 points as Kansas State (2-0) made 8 of 13 shots from behind the arc. Justin Edwards had 15, and Nigel Johnson added 12 for the Wildcats.

Martez Harrison had 21 points and Broderick Newbill had 11 to pace UMKC (1-1).

Trailing 45-39 early in the second half, Kansas State made three consecutive 3-pointers to take a 48-46 lead, which was its first since 2-1 in the opening minute.

"I told (the team) at halftime that I didn't want to lose," Gipson said. "You think it's bad now, we end up losing and it's going to look bad on us. We don't want to look like that. I put the team on my shoulders and Nigel and I wanted to come out and play hard in the second half and make a statement. Everybody followed through."

The scoring stretch gave Kansas State a 64-53 lead with 9:21 left, which was its largest of the game.

Gipson, who plays at 6-foot-7, 265 pounds, used his strength put the Kangaroo frontcourt in foul trouble as he went 9 of 10 from the free throw line in the second half alone. He scored 13 second-half points.

"Coach Weber made some adjustments there in going small," UMKC coach Kareem Richardson said. "They had four shooters surrounded by Gipson, who we all know is a load inside. They emphasized getting the ball inside early and it got us into more foul trouble."

The Kangaroos, who were coming off of a season-opening upset at Missouri, started right where they left off on Friday night, jumping out to a 21-13 lead and shooting 62.7 percent from the field through the game's opening 9 minutes.

"That first 10 or 12 minutes, we didn't have many answers

for them," Weber said. "We kept preaching to them on how active they are in the zone. You can't make lazy, casual passes."

UMKC's biggest first half lead, 26-15, came off of a Newbill 3-pointer with 9:48

left before the break, but Kansas State answered with an 11-4 run.

Newbill scored eight points in the first half and Harrison chipped in seven points with two assists for UMKC.

Kansas State moved to 17-1 all-time against the Kangaroos, including an 11-0 mark at Bramlage Coliseum.



## Jayhawks Fall Short to No. 4 TCU, 34-30

LAWRENCE, Kan. — On fourth and inches from Kansas' 14-yard line with 2:14 left in the game, TCU mustered its lone fourth-down conversion of the game to end all hopes of a KU upset, as the Kansas football team dropped its home finale to the Horned Frogs, 34-30, Saturday afternoon at Memorial Stadium.

The Jayhawks (3-7, 1-6 Big 12) controlled the scoreboard for more than 24 minutes in the middle half of the game until a TCU (9-1, 6-1 Big 12) touchdown with 2:38 left in the third quarter swept the game away from Kansas and gave the Horned Frogs the momentum they needed to outlast KU in the final period of play.

Senior tight end Jimmay Mundine and junior wide receiver Nigel King bolstered the KU aerial assault, combining for 265 of the Jayhawks' 418 yards of offense with 100-plus-yard efforts and a score each. King finished the day with five receptions and a career-high 128 yards, while Mundine shattered his previous career mark with 137 yards on seven grabs. Those 137 yards were the most by a Kansas tight end since 1974.

Junior quarterback Michael Cummings aired it out for a career-high 332 yards and two touchdown tosses, while freshman running back Corey Avery accounted for one of KU's two rushing scores, with Cummings being the other. Cummings' 332 yards rank 20th all-time for most passing yards in a game and were the most since Todd

Reesing threw for 338 against Duke Sept. 19, 2009.

The Kansas defense harnessed the momentum and energy the offense sparked throughout the contest and forced three TCU turnovers while also coming up huge on a fourth-down stop deep in KU territory which led to one of the Jayhawks' four touchdowns on the day.

Senior linebacker Ben Heeney turned in the seventh double-digit tackling performance of the season and 18th of his career with 11 stops. Senior safety Cassius Sendish was right on his heels with 10 tackles of his own, while junior linebacker Jake Love tallied seven.

TCU wasted no time getting its high-powered offense rolling in the first quarter, scoring on its opening possession just two minutes into the contest. The Horned Frogs strung together a seven-play, 67-yard drive, capped off by a 27-yard strike from Heisman hopeful quarterback Trevone Boykin to wide receiver Ty Slanina for the game's first touchdown.

The quick score didn't deflate the Jayhawks' spirit, as the offense — with a little help from a TCU personal foul and some special teams magic — marched down the field and punched the ball in the end zone for six points of their own by way of a two-yard run by Avery.

The drive started with senior running back Tony Pierson taking the ball on the KU 37-yard line and rushing 12 yards to jump-start the offensive attack.

However, three incomplete passes in a row from Cummings brought senior punter Trevor Pardula onto the field on fourth down. TCU linebacker Paul Whitmill rushed off the edge and clipped Pardula on the punt attempt, breathing new life into the KU offense.

With renewed spirit, Kansas chalked up two first downs to move just outside the red zone at the TCU 23-yard line, thanks to a 14-yard rush by Pierson and an eight-yard grab by King. Stuffed on third down, sophomore kicker Matthew Wyman trotted onto the field to have a go at a 40-yard attempt.

Interim head coach Clint Bowen had something different in mind and called for sophomore quarterback and holder T.J. Millward to roll out attempting a fake field goal. Millward completed just his second pass of the season, hitting senior tight end Trent Smiley for 10 yards and a first down to the Horned Frogs' 13-yard line. Cummings followed suit and capped the 17-play drive off with a 12-yard bullet to senior wide receiver Nick Harwell to pull within one of TCU, 7-6.

After allowing three first downs on three big plays, the Kansas defense tightened up and held the Horned Frogs stagnant on a fourth-down attempt on its own 11-yard line to hand the reigns back to the offense trailing by one point.

The Jayhawks controlled the pace into the second quarter after the turnover on downs, grinding out their longest drive

of the season of six minutes and 18 seconds. Cummings and Mundine highlighted the aerial assault with the tight end hauling in all three passes thrown to him for 50 of the drive's 89 yards and KU's second touchdown to take the first lead over a top-five opponent for the first time since the 2008 FedEx Orange Bowl against Virginia Tech, 13-7.

TCU mustered one last scoring effort in the second period when kicker Jaden Oberkrom connected on a 24-yard field goal to pull within three of the Jayhawks, 13-10, with 3:41 to play in the half.

Kansas carried its first-half momentum into the third quarter and opened the frame with a touchdown to build a 10-point lead, 20-10. Of the 82-yard

drive, Mundine hauled in 77 yards receiving, including a career-long 67-yard grab to set up Cummings for an easy rushing touchdown.

The Horned Frogs answered back with a touchdown of their own, to pull back within three, 20-17. KU didn't quit and on the first play of the ensuing drive, King hauled in a one-handed grab dancing down the sideline from Cummings for 78 yards and his first score of the season to increase KU's lead back to 10, 27-17.

TCU scored 14-unanswered points to close out the quarter, capped off by a 69-yard punt return for a touchdown by wide receiver Cameron Echols-Luper to give the Horned Frogs their first lead since the KU's touchdown early in the second

quarter, 31-27, which they held the remainder of the game. A field goal early in the fourth by Oberkrom increased the lead to seven, 34-27, with 12:08 to play.

However, a 23-yard field goal by Wyman was all the Jayhawks had left in the tank, as they fell short of the upset, 34-30.

The Jayhawks head to Oklahoma for the first of back-to-back road games to close out the 2014 slate, Saturday, Nov. 22. Kickoff against the Sooners is set for 11 a.m., and can be seen on FOX Sports 1.
