- Off-season training for outdoor sports
- Walking-running track
- Cardio and strength training

• Multipurpose rooms, including kitchen facilities, for:

- Group exercise classes
- Community meals
- Meetings

• Aquatics for (see also Priority 4: Indoor Aquatics):

- Water therapy
- Swimming lessons
- Leisure swimming
- Competitive swimming (future need, specifically if/when K-State Natatorium is closed)

Brake Finally Having Fun With Upstart Paper

(Editor's Note: Last month the Manhattan Free Press started its 24th year of service to Manhattan, Riley County and Kansas State University. This is a Reprint from: The International Society Of Weekly Newspaper Editors in 2000.)

Running a newspaper alone seems next to impossible, but Jon Brake, editor and publisher of the Manhattan, Kan., Free Press, makes it happen.

"I sell the ads, write the news, attend the meetings, take the photos, lay out the paper, take it to the press, deliver to the stores and do the billing," he said.

Unfortunately, that is not all the work being the sole staff member entails.

"I also clean the bathroom on Saturday," Brake said.

The Manhattan Free Press is published on Thursdays, so Wednesdays can be hectic. Brake's wife, Linda, owns Roche's Family Hair Care in Manhattan, but she occasionally helps out with the paper.

"She will come in on Wednesday if I am running late," Brake said.

Although he loves what he does now, Brake has not always been involved with Journalism. He attended Kansas State University in Manhattan for two and a half years as a history major before being called for active duty in Berlin, Germany, in 1961. (Editor's Note: We spent one year at Fort Riley, Ks. not in Germany.)

At age 22 Brake began selling advertising for a twice-weekly newspaper in Marysville, Kan. After seven years in that job, he switched careers and became a real estate broker. Ten years later, in 1980, Brake returned to journalism business.

After more than 20 years of working in journalism, Brake started his own paper, the Manhattan Free Press, in 1991.

"I was tired of being fired by others," he said.

The paper was started with only \$487. The first office on Poyntz Avenue cost \$300 a month, but the office owner offered Brake a special of six months free rent. Brake also convinced a computer store to sell him a used Mac in exchange for free advertising.

Following that exchange, however, advertising went downhill.

"The first issue was one week late because I could not sell the ads," Brake said. "I had the news ready to go, but every time I talked to an advertiser,

they thought it was a good idea, but they wanted to see the first issue. Which comes first, the newspaper or advertising?"

The second week Brake came up with a different strategy. He offered a double-truck ad to a furniture store and a full-page ad to a car dealer at half price if they paid in advance.

"That did the trick," he said.

"That first Thursday morning was special."

Brake had 2,000 newspapers in bundles of 100. He planned on rolling the newspapers, loading them into his car and throwing them up and down the streets of Manhattan.

"After about 15 minutes, I could see that this was going to be a much large job than I had planned," Brake said. "About that time I heard people coming down the hall."

His brother, Clark, and his 78-year-old mother had driven 45 miles to help, and they continued to do so each week.

"For the next two years, the three of us looked like the Beverly Hillbillies," Brake said. "Our mother would be in the back seat rolling papers, and Clark and I would roll and throw the papers. 'A good time was had by all!'"

Today the Free Press is distributed in locations within Manhattan. And advertising definitely picked up after that first disheartening week.

On top of the stress of a small staff and finding time for family, Brake has to worry about competition with two of

the best newspapers in Kansas. he Manhattan Mercury is a 10,000-circulation daily, and the Kansas State University paper, the Kansas State Collegian, has a pressrun of 12,000 each weekday of the college's fall and spring semesters. But Brake does not allow the competition to intimidate him.

In fact, he said having the KSU paper near helps him. He uses the university's news service items, and if its paper has a good story, Brake uses it and gives KSU credit. He also takes photos at all the Wildcat football games.

Brake said the Free Press has its own place between the Mercury and the Collegian because his paper deals solely with community issues rather than national and college news.

"I think a newspaper should report on everything the city, county and school district is doing," he said. "We run a lot of memos, minutes, and charts. I have never seen any budget that I did not want to run."

Although Brake loves running a community paper, he said it does come with its disadvantages. He said government employees are often difficult to deal with because they do not want to open public records.

"It is more fun today, more fun than anything I have ever done," he said.

"When invited to speak to journalism classes, I tell them that they cannot work for other people and do what I do," he said. "We cover city, county and the school district in a way that a large newspaper cannot."

So although Brake has not always been interested in journalism, and even though he left the field for a decade, he eventually could not resist the draw of running a community newspaper.

"It is more fun today, more fun than anything I have ever done," he said.

Wedel presented the request to extend the Native Stone Scenic Byway into Riley County.

Wedel recommended approval of the proposal to extend the Native Stone Scenic Byway as requested.

Briggs a landowner on the Highway 177 corridor. Briggs said he is concerned with what

the future may bring to the entrance to the community. Briggs stated with this being a Federal Program how restrictions could be placed in the future. Briggs stated he is concerned with the rights of the landowners.

Shields said the Native Stone Scenic Byway is a State program not a Federal program, which allows for local control.

Shield stated KDOT is supportive of the program. Shield stated the sign regulations discussed earlier is a KDOT regulation not part of the Native Stone Scenic Byway program.

Shield said the KDOT right-of-way staff would be the people to talk to about allowed signage.

Shield stated a problem with segmenting sections eliminates those segments for grants through byway programs. Shield recommended against segmenting out sections.

Thomas said Steve Springer's sign would come under the same regulations as billboards.

Erikson read the mission statement of the Native Stone Scenic Byway. Erikson said the Scenic Byway committee helps promote economic growth of the communities.

Smallie, representing Travel Kansas, discussed how the Byways promote travel in Kansas.

Clark stated she feels this is coming from the top down as oppose to being from our local Riley County Community.

Wells said when he thinks of byways he thinks of rural settings, not like some portions of this extension being considered. Wells stated he would be partially supportive of the rural areas of K-18 but not down Highway 177.

Boyd stated he is supportive of the Byway Programs, but is not sure we are aware of all the impacts of the proposal.

Wilson said he is concerned landowners have not been involved in the proposal sooner. Wilson stated he is also concerned about restricting property rights.



Chisholm Trail 150th Anniversary Kickoff Event Planned At Abilene

ABILENE, KAN. - Trail, Rails and Tales, the Spirit of the Chisholm Trail has been chosen as the theme of the kickoff event planned here next year to promote and honor the sesquicentennial of the Chisholm Trail in 2017. The event will be on Labor Day weekend, Sept. 2-3, 2016.

The trail, made famous through stories, movies and song, was used by Texas cattle ranchers to drive their herds north to the railroad in Abilene, Kan. where the cattle could be sold and shipped east. The first

shipment of Texas longhorns left Abilene via rail on Sept. 5, 1867.

The states of Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas, through which the cattle were driven, will mark the 150th anniversary of the Chisholm Trail throughout 2017 with numerous special events.

The Trail, Rails and Tales celebration will be the first of a number of Abilene events focusing on the town's role as the first railhead at the end of the Chisholm Trail.

"Just like family style din-

ing, the Trail, Rails and Tales, Spirit of the Chisholm Trail event here in Abilene, Kan. plans to offer a menu of events that will tantalize the whole family to come to Abilene for some Chisholm Trail history," says Deb Sanders, kickoff event chairwoman. "Drive your family 'herd' to Abilene and experience the longhorn cattle being loaded onto a cattle car and carried out of town by a steam locomotive; heck, you can even ride the same train as the longhorns. Cowboy poets, historic re-enactors, can-can girls, a chuckwagon cook-off, and a buckaroo camp for the younger cowboys and cowgirls are just the tip of the tale! So herd your family into Abilene in September of 2016 for an Old West Experience."

Sanders says a book, "All Along the Chisholm Trail, 1867-1889" by James W. Parker, gives the account of the Sept. 5, 1867 celebration in Abilene when the first shipment of longhorns headed East and was inspiration for the kick-off celebration planned for next year."The first herd using the new Chisholm Trail consisted of 2,400 longhorns that started out from San Antonio, Texas and reached Abilene, Kansas in 1867," Parker writes in the book. "When the first shipment of Texas cattle left Abilene by railroad for Chicago, the event was celebrated in festive tents with feasting, wine, speeches and song. The new trail worked. And so the Chisholm Trail began."

The committee planning the Trail, Rails and Tales, the Spirit of the Chisholm Trail event toured sites related to the trail on Sunday.

"The large group was able to tour the Chisholm Trail sites together thanks to Mary Jane Oard of the Abilene and Smoky Valley Railroad that provided

the bus driven by Joe Minick," Sanders says.

Michael Hook, Abilene historian, narrated the tour that included the town's early history along Texas Street, where Marshals Wild Bill Hickok and Tom Smith kept order in saloons filled with rowdy cowboys fresh off the trail and the likes of outlaws Jesse James and John Wesley Hardin.

"To make the Texans feel at home in the North, they named the saloons and gambling halls after Texas and cattle names," Hook says. "The Alamo, the Lone Star, Bull's Head, Longhorn, the Trail, Old Fruit, Elkhorn and the Pearl were among the legendary saloons."

Hook also pointed out the former site of T.C. McInerney's Drovers Boot Store where he said the first pointed-toe, high-heeled cowboy boot was invented. Hook discovered a McInerney boot advertisement in The Abilene Chronicle newspaper dated 1871, four years before an Olathe company was given credit for the invention, he adds.

Other highlights of the tour included the site of the Drovers Cottage and Great Western Stockyards in Abilene, Smoky Hill River crossing, and Elm Springs near Carlton where a waterfall offered the trail-dusty cowboys the opportunity to bathe before entering Abilene.

Sharon and Don Meyer of Trail Boss Chuckwagon served dinner from their chuckwagon on the property of Jerry and Pam Unruh near Durham, where ruts from cattle drives still can be seen. Gary and Margaret Kraisinger, the authors of two books on the Western Cattle Trail, spoke about the life of the cowboy on the trail.

During the tour, Ron Wilson, cowboy poet lariat, shared his poem about the Chisholm Trail and others he has written.



Up to 305 Clinton emails might have classified data

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department review of Hillary Rodham Clinton's emails so far has found as many as 305 messages that could contain classified information and require further scrutiny by federal agencies, the department said Monday.

In a court filing that was part of a lawsuit against the State Department, officials told a federal judge in Washington they would be able to meet an existing schedule to release copies of Clinton's emails because only about 5 percent of the messages reviewed so far contain possible secret information that could hold them back for further analysis. The agency said those 305 emails with potential classified data were among more than 1,500 documents analyzed so far.

The filing came after Clinton said in an Iowa radio interview that during her stint as secretary of state in the Obama administration, she had never sent or received any emails on her private server that had information clearly marked classified. Republican critics have warned that Clinton may have compromised national security by sending and receiving messages that contained secret information, but she has sloughed off the criticism, saying she followed security guidelines and is the one who made the previously withheld emails available to the American public.

"If I had not asked for my emails all to be made public, none of this would have been in the public arena," she said in the interview, recorded last Friday. But The Associated Press and other news organizations had sought copies of Clinton's emails under the U.S. Freedom of Information Act for years.

The AP was first to identify Clinton's private email server and trace it in March to her family's home in New York. The server was surrendered to the FBI last week, months after Clinton said it was her personal property and wouldn't be turned over.

Clinton said in March she

had exchanged about 60,000 emails during her four years in the Obama administration, about half of which were personal and deleted. She turned over the others to the State Department, which is reviewing and releasing them on a

monthly basis. Clinton campaign officials did not respond Monday to an emailed request for comment about the court filing about her correspondence.

The State Department has censored some of Clinton's emails for national security reasons before they were publicly released. The government blacked-out all or parts of those messages under a provision of the Freedom of Information Act intended to protect material that had been deemed and properly classified for purposes of national defense or foreign policy.

Last month, the inspector general for the State Department warned that some of the information that passed through Clinton's homebrew server was classified information produced by the U.S. intelligence community. It's generally not possible to forward or cut-and-paste an email marked classified to a private account because classified email systems are closed to outsiders. But it can be illegal to paraphrase or retype classified information from a secure email into an unprotected message sent to a personal address.

The State Department acknowledgement that 305 Clinton emails were being reviewed for possible national security concerns came as part of legal sparring in a lawsuit against the agency by journalist Jason Leopold, a reporter with Vice News. In January, Leopold sued the agency to quickly produce Clinton emails and other documents that were sought under a freedom of information request dating back to 2014.

Leopold's case is one of several pending against the State Department for Clinton records. The AP also sued the agency this year for failing to turn over copies of emails and other documents since mid-2013 and in one case, back to 2010. In both cases, U.S. district court judges have pressed the State Department to produce records on a firm schedule.

But Leopold's lawyers have raised concerns that the intelligence review of Clinton's emails has bogged down the schedule of release ordered previously by U.S. District Judge Rudolph Contreras.

Leopold's lawyer said the

department missed its July target by more than 1,000 pages of emails, in part because of

intelligence agencies for review, the government was confident that the low number — 5.1 percent of the total — would not slow down public release of the emails.

Separate from the court case, State Department spokesman John Kirby said 63 of Clinton's emails that previously were unclassified have now been classified and censored of the

more than 3,000 emails released. The numbers of emails, Kirby stressed, represent a "small amount." But it reflects "the care and the scrutiny with which we are scrutinizing this email traffic."

Also Monday, Senate Judiciary Committee Chairman Charles Grassley, R-Iowa, said he has asked Clinton's long-time lawyer, David Kendall,

about whether he and other members of his law firm received national security clearances as part of their legal work for the former top diplomat.

Grassley wrote Kendall in an Aug. 14 letter that he was also concerned the lawyer kept thumb-drive copies of Clinton's emails that were not properly secured.







McCrane Aims for 100 Percent

When you ask Wildcat sophomore place kicker Matthew McCrane his goal for the 2015 season, he doesn't hold back.

"I think (kicking) 100 percent is obtainable, I really do," McCrane said. The tone in his voice had a matter-of-fact nature to it. "My goal is to win the (Lou) Groza Award; to reach Martin Gramatica (1994-98) status. That's what I want to do."

While the goal of perfection may seem like a daunting task to some, to McCrane, it's not far from reach.

As a redshirt freshman, McCrane played in 10 games and led the nation by making 94.7-percent of his field-goal attempts (18-of-19) in addition to connecting on 41-of-42 extra points. He earned both All-Big 12 and All-America honors after his first season and has high hopes to keep those honors throughout the remainder of his career.

The best freshman kicking campaign in school history, McCrane is the only K-State freshman kicker to connect on a pair of 50-yard field goals, including a freshman record-long 53-yarder against Oklahoma State. He totaled a freshman record-breaking 94 points – a number that shattered Gramatica's record of 56 points as a freshman in 1994.

Gramatica went on to win the Lou Groza Award (given to

the nation's top kicker) in 1997, and McCrane was named to the watch list for that same award heading into this season.

"I don't feel a lot of pressure; it's more nerves and wanting to prove that last year wasn't just a freak year," McCrane explained. "That's what I'm wanting to do. I've never been nervous in a game – I really haven't – and I hope that doesn't happen this year. I want to just stay calm and keep my goals set in my mind."

Though McCrane had a near-perfect year last season, there are still areas of his game he has been working to improve upon before the 2015 season begins.

"The biggest thing we have to do is to get his leg strength up and get the ball up in the air, high off the ground," said associate head coach and special teams coordinator Sean Snyder. "That's been the biggest thing with him. He's obviously a very accurate kicker, but we've got to develop his strength and continue to grow him there."

Echoed McCrane, "I'm hitting the ball great right now. I'm really hitting the ball well, but one of the things I'm working on is ball height. I think it was evident in the TCU game; I hit a low ball and it got blocked. I can't have that happen this year."

McCrane's solo extra point miss last year came by way of a block, so if he wants to be perfect, he knows he will have to get the ball up high.

"He's very ambitious," continued Snyder about McCrane. "He sets his goals and his standards high. From one season to the next, typically when you have someone who is coming off of a very successful season, they take some things for granted, but Matt just keeps setting his goal higher and higher. He knows he's a long ways away from where he and I would want him to be. It may not look like it, but he's got a lot of work ahead of him."

McCrane knows what it takes to be great and has the work ethic and experience to get there. Coming off of a red-shirt freshman season where he saw plenty of excitement on the field, with his goals in mind, McCrane is ready to kick off the 2015 season and prove himself to the nation yet again.

"I'm extremely excited for this season," said McCrane. The smile on his face spread from ear to ear. "I look forward to the season every year, but knowing I have the starting role right now, it's even more exciting. So, my goal is 100 percent. I think if your goal isn't 100 percent, then something is wrong and it's my goal. I want to reach that Gramatica status and I want to win the Groza. It's exciting to think about all those things because it's things like that that I dreamed of as a kid."

The Wildcats open their 120th season of football on Saturday, September 5, as K-State hosts South Dakota. The game, which is slated for a 6:10

p.m., kickoff, will be shown world-wide on K-StateHD.TV beginning at 5:30 p.m., with the K-State Gameday preview show.

K-State is closing in on yet another season sellout for 2015, which would run its consecutive streak of filling Bill Snyder Family Stadium to 27 straight games, as a very limited number of tickets remain.


